The Jaycees have taught me so much throughout the course of my life I don't even know where to start.... So let's start at the beginning. I was literally born into this chapter; I was born during one of our chapters very successful haunted house projects here in Columbus. My father showed up to the hospital dressed as Dracula even, so I have had a lifetime of experience around the Jaycees. Growing up my dad owned his own businesses just as many members and past members do today, and I'm sure it is not news to you that when you run your own business you are working 12+hours a day. In spite of working 12 hours+ every day of the week my parents always made time for Jaycee meetings, events, and gatherings. From a young age this taught me while physical things and money are nice, really it is your community and friends that matter the most. Today I work the normal 40 hour a week job just like everyone else, have family events to attend to and the normal things we all like to do like concerts, festivals etc. But no matter what I always make time for the Jaycees, because this is a group of friends that is truly doing what is important and making a difference in the community we all live in.


One of the best ways to describe the skills I picked up in the chapter, most of which I learned without even realizing I was learning them, is to describe my catering/planning skills. 10 years ago if you had come to me and said "I need you to plan and pull off a dinner for 30 people in one month." I would have spent 29 days stressed out and running around with no direction, 1 day trying to get everything done, and three days in the hospital recovering from a nervous breakdown. During my time with the Jaycees I have had the opportunity to work and chair events like Ohio State concessions inside the stadium, working food booths at fairs and carnivals, selling beverages at concerts and large events, planning festivals of my own, training people how to cook and serve for large amounts of people, and even catering a couple weddings and parties.

Now I did not set out with the intention to learn how to plan and host parties or events, I did not set out to learn how to put together a festival or how to manage traffic or safety, but just by participating in Jaycee events and helping where I could I picked up all of these skills. Today if you came up and asked me, the same guy that used to struggle to put together a meal for 5 people, to plan and facilitate an event for 600 people in 3 days not only could I do it, I could do it pretty stress free. This is by volunteering with the Jaycees I have "been there and done that", so I know how to do it. That knowledge has not just allowed me to put together some events that impress even me (I am my harshest critic), but have allowed me to step outside of the Jaycees and take on some pretty big challenges. I have been able to assume the chairman position with the Asian Festival (which is a 130,000+ person event) on the organizing committee as head of parking, traffic, safety, and security. I have made such a name for myself in the festival world here in

Columbus that the Art's Festival has approached me and asked me if I would take control of parking for their event. All of the skills for organization, recruiting, managing, negotiating, and even how to conduct myself in high pressure meetings with city and state officials has all come from what the Jaycees have taught me, and the majority of it I was unaware I was even learning, I was just having a good time with my friends and trying to help the community at the same time. There are many other things the Jaycees have taught me like self-control, fiscal and fiduciary responsibility, and time management just to name a few. But the most important thing the Jaycees have given me is the confidence to know that I can do anything I want to.
